HENDERSON, Horace W. piano/arranger/composer

Born: Cuthbert, Georgia, 22nd November, 1904 Died: Denver, Colorady, 29th August, 1988

Brother of Fletcher H. Began piano studies at 14, spent a years at Atlanta University, then studied at Wilberforce College for three years (gaines A.B. degree). Formed own student band, the Collegians. During summer vacation of 1924 the band worked at the Bamville Club, New York, during the following year they played resisdency at Lawrence, Massachusetts, then began regular touring (using the Wilberforce campus as its base until summer of 1926). Regular rours and residencies in 1927, began working as the Dixie Stompers in 1928. Horace temporarily disbanded and worked with Sammy Stewart (late 1928). Reformed for touring in 1929, played further residencies in New York (929 - 1931), Rockland Palace, Connie's Inn, etc., relinquished leadership to Don Redman, continued to work with Redman until early 1933 (worked for a week in Duke Ellington's Orchestra in New York - November 1932). Played in Fletcher Henderson's Band fromearly 1933 until late 1934, again led own band, then worked with Vetrnon Andrade in New York from spring 1935. Rejoined Fletcher early in 1936, left to form own big band for residency at Swingland, Chicago (July 1937), led on and off there for over a year, the band then played at the Savoy, Chicago (1938), and toured. At Grand Terrace, Chicago, from January 1939, subsequently at the 5100 Club. Disbanded, then reformed big band using most of Nat Towles' personnel until December 1940. Served in U.S. Army from November 1942 until August 1943, rejoined Fletcher in Chicago. Left Fletcher in New York (May 1944), became accompanist for vocaliste Lena Horne, re-formed big band in July 1945, debut at Plantation, Los Angeles, then long residency at the Million Dollar Theatre, Los Angeles (1947-49). Led own small group in Chicago from September 1949 until spring 1950. During the 1950s led own band in Minneapolis, Las Vegas, California, etc. Worked with the 'Billy Williams' Revue'in the early 1960s, also toured with own big band. During the late 1960s worked mainly in Denver, Colorado. Arranger for many bandleaders including: Fletcher Henderson, Benny Goodman, Charlie Barnett, The Casa Loma Orchestra, Tommy Dorsey, Earl Hines, Jimmie Lunceford, etc.

The following statements and the resulting list of recordings only reflect the opinion of this writer/listener and are open to discussion. More so, discussion is eagerly invited. Corrections, amendments and controversal opinions are much appreciated.

### HORACE HENDERSON AND HIS ORCHESTRA

Although these sides are recorded under Horace Henderson's name, this actually is Fletcher Henderson's Orchestra. The band seems to be more in a pensive mood, here, and there is one vocal only on these sides – by Henry Red Allen on 'Ol' Man River'. 'Minnie The Moocher's Wedding Day' gets a band treatment, only. Obviously, they did not have a singer to present this song in an appropriate way. But there is

phantastic soloing all over, at the most by Coleman Hawkins, then by Dicky Wells on his silken and ruptured off-beat trombone, a rather tame Henry Red Allen on open trumpet, and additionally some solo spots by Bobby Stark, Hilton Jefferson on clarinet, and a mere eight fine bars by Claude Jones on muted trombone.

This is the entire Fletcher Henderson band lent to his brother Horace who, nevertheless, was the band's main pianist at that time, playing more up-to-date piano than Fletcher, and more to the musicians' liking. Obviously, Horace kept a contract for these recordings mediated by John Hammond, but without having a working band. So, Fletcher helped out with his entire band.

'Happy Feet' has a rather conventional arrangement the author of which seems to be unknown. But the tune starts with a nice lightly swinging piano solo by Horace Henderson followed short solos by Red Allen in his very personal way as well as by Dicky Wells, also very much his own. Follows 'Rhythm Crazy' in Horace's arrangement, with an array of soloists including Bobby Stark, shortly before leaving the Henderson stable and changing over to Chick Webb. He plays a typical personal solo, very vertical and much in contrast to Henry Red Allen's horizontal approach. 'Ol' Man River' is played at a tame pace compared to other versions of this famous warhorse of 1927. Red Allen gets both a vocal chorus and a trumpet solo. Cab Calloway's tune 'Minnie The Moocher's Wedding Day' as part or chapter of the very macabre and amusing story of his heroine Minnie The Moocher gets a fair instrumental treatment, but looses all its charms of the vocal version. As in Fletcher Henderson's arrangement of 'It's The Talk Of The Town' (of session 179) I hear John Kirby on very smooth tuba in 'Ain't Cha Glad?', playing long sustained notes. This certainly is not a bowed bass violin. Again, I am supported by Jörg Kuhfuss here (see session 179). And this arrangement probably is by Fletcher Henderson, too. So, I assume that he had a special liking for the old-fashioned bass instrument in slow to medium tunes. (I have a special liking for this!) On the other hand, I feel unable to determine whether it is an adventurous Claude Jones or a retained Dicky Wells playing the trombone solo at the beginning. And again in 'Torch Song', I hear a tuba. Rather bowed string bass here, or yet tuba? I am entangled! But after re-re-re-listening: TUBA!

This recording session of Horace Henderson and his Orchestra – under Fletcher Henderson's name (see below) – have an almost entire Chicagoan personnel and was recorded in Chicago, where the band resided at the Grand Terrace Ballroom for a time. These sides thus do not belong to Harlem Jazz, and are only listed for the sake of completeness of Horace Henderson's band.

W.C. Allen, Hendersonia, p. 403: "Fletcher's connection with this session was apparently solely to lend his name to help promote his brother's band., then playing actively in Chicago with this fine local crew. The identity of some of the soloists is open to question: the Roy Eldridge-like trumpeter is assumed to be Berry, using his earlier recordings with Fletcher as a criterion; and the Hawkins-like tenor sax is assumed to be Young, although solos by Williams on available Taft Jordan and Chick Webb records are in similar style."

This certainly is fine aggregation of musicians of the Chicago circle and it's a good band. But, as these and the subsequent sides by the Horace Henderson band are also recorded in Chicago, they simply do not belong to Harlem body of jazz records. Yet, for the sake of this great musician – Elmer Williams – I'd like to add these records to my list of Harlem Jazz.

And I like to follow W.C. Allen's identifications of soloists. The tenor sax solos heard are different from Elmer Williams manner insofar as their instrumental style is much simpler rhythmically and tonally more polished than Williams' style. So, no Elmer Williams solos on these sides!

This recording session of Horace Henderson and his Orchestra have have an almost entire Chicagoan personnel and was recorded in Chicago, where the band resided at the Grand Terrace Ballroom for a time. These sides thus do not belong to Harlem Jazz, and are only listed for the sake of completeness of Horace Henderson's band.

Notwithstanding the fact that this is Horace Henderson's Chicago band with mainly Chicago musicians, Elmer Williams is on tenor as before and can be heard soloing shortly in 'You're Mine, You' (see notes session 034 above). The band is Horace Henderson's, and a part of the titles recorded are arranged by the bandleader.

'Honeysuckle Rose' gets a strange treatment as the arranger did not keep the original chord structure, but finds original new ways of chording.

The last two titles, at least, have a baritone sax in the section, and I believe its player to be Willie Randall. *Notes:*

We are in Harlem, New York, here again, and the musicians were in parts taken over from Nat Towles' Territory band of Omaha, Nebraska. These guys obviously – and aurally – had been influenced by some young and fresh ideas of jazz harmonics and melodics as used in the MidWestern states, Kansas City above all. And we easily hear them try out these novel methods and settings, as best heard in 'Sir Charles' Thompson's arrangement of 'Smooth Sailing'. Very nice and interesting, what these young musicians have in their minds, but still, Emmett Berry with his conventional style gets the most improvisational honours.
